That afternoon, while they napped, we painted the fence, mowed the lawn, edged and swept the sidewalks, trimmed trees, moved 100 chairs and a big pile of lumber. Charley Gallia and Jeff Jones joined us for lunch and devotional since they were working on remodeling the kitchen. After all that work in the heat, we showered in our FLC, ate at the Kitchen Table at Buca di Beppo, then watched a movie in our Youth Center.

Tuesday was our day of play. We started by quacking at folks from the Duck Boat and eating lunch at Juan in a Million. We delivered the VBS donations of pet food to the Town Lake Animal Shelter as well as socks and underwear to Austin Children's Shelter. Then we headed to Georgetown to Inner Space Caverns, Southwestern University and a picnic dinner at the Creative Playscape. We ended the day by watching the bats come out downtown and cooling off with Amy's Ice Cream.

Wednesday we joined a rowdy group of NWHUMC folks to learn how to play “Mexican Train” dominoes in the Upper Room. After that, joined by Jenny's mom, we played our favorite new game “Apples to Apples” and ate lunch in Graffiti Lounge. Our receipts were \$3,495 below budget for June and our expenses were \$5,559 below budget giving us little change in our status so far this year. This leaves us with expenses \$9,245 greater than income for the year. We started paying principal on both of our mortgages in April. We have reduced our total principal over \$52,000 so far this year with a combination of payments on both mortgages from the operating budget along with continuing contributions to the Building fund plus new contributions for the Capital Debt reduction program. With high energy bills coming in due to the recent record high temperatures, we encourage everyone to help us make it through the “summer slump” by catching up on your giving if you are behind or giving in advance if you are able. We have completed our Set Our Vision Free! campaign with pledges totaling almost \$600,000. We celebrate that this will save us more than \$775,000 in interest over the period of our loan! We bring emotional baggage into caregiving of a parent, partner, or sibling. Our histories together create challenging circumstances as roles, expectations and needs change. Even if you manage to sort your own challenges, you will still have to cope with others in the process as they strug-

gle to make the transformation themselves. These issues are compounded when the person has memory loss, impulse control or regression to previous behavioral traits. Some, free from neurological problems, have rewritten history to meet their own psychological needs. Come get new ideas and explore ways to reach the other side of this minefield successfully.

Becky Davis is a psychotherapist in private. She currently facilitates 2 community support groups for caregivers of those with Alzheimer’s disease. Additionally, Becky co-facilitates a support group for New Connections, an outreach ministry of Westlake Presbyterian in conjunction with funding from the St David’s foundation.

Driving Your Wallet Empty

Over 3145 miles per gallon! Impossible you say! Crazy inventor story you say! Well, it is true. In 2007 SAE sponsored a mileage competition up in beautiful Michigan. Over 30 teams from the U.S., Canada, India and Bahrain participated. The competition was for a single person vehicle powered by a four-cycle engine with a minimum of three wheels and the driver fully enclosed. The winner (University of British Columbia) achieved a record 3,145 miles per gallon!

What is your gasoline mileage? Are you driving your wallet empty? Here are a few thoughts on how to improve your mileage performance.

Your car's gasoline mileage is controlled by engine efficiency, car weight, aerodynamic drag and driving style. A car typically performs best at constant speeds between 25 and 55 mph. Below 25 mph the mileage decreases and drops to zero when idling. Above 55 mph aerodynamic drag is increasingly important and the mileage rapidly decreases. Big vehicles have more aerodynamic drag than small cars and typically have lower mileage at highway speeds. Heavy vehicles require more power to accelerate away from stop lights and typically have lower mileage in "stop and go" city driving.

Driving tips for a mid-sized vehicle with gasoline priced at \$4.08 per gallon are presented below.

Gas mileage decreases rapidly at speeds above 60 mph. Each 5 mph increase over 60 mph can lower your gas mileage up to 7%.

Gasoline cost penalty \$0.29 per gal @ 65 mph
 \$0.90 per gal @ 75 mph

Aggressive driving (speeding, rapid acceleration from stops and hard braking) can lower your mileage up to 33% at highway speeds and over 5% around town. Studies indicate aggressive driving will reduce travel time only about 4%, or the equivalent of one minute in a 30-minute trip. Question: is it worth burning 33% more gas to save 4% in time?

Gasoline cost penalty \$1.35 per gal (highway)
 \$0.20 per gal (town)

Cargo or cargo racks on top of your vehicle increase aerodynamic drag and lower mileage. A loaded roof rack can decrease mileage by up to 5%.

Gasoline cost penalty \$0.21 per gal (highway)

Avoid keeping unnecessary items in your vehicle. Each extra 100 pounds in your vehicle can reduce mileage by up to 2%.

Gasoline cost penalty \$0.08 per gal

Running the air conditioner will decrease mileage; operating on "max" can reduce mileage up to 20%. The fan setting, however, doesn't affect fuel efficiency. For greatest fuel savings leave windows closed and use the flow-through air vent system.

Gasoline cost penalty \$0.80 per gal

Fixing a car that is out of tune or failed an emissions test can improve its gas mileage up to 4%. Fixing a serious problem (faulty oxygen sensor) can improve mileage even more

Gasoline cost penalty \$0.16 per gal

For those driving pickup trucks, aerodynamic drag can be reduced by lowering the tailgate (up to 4%) or using a tonneau cover (up to 12%). Cargo nets and no tail gates actually increase aerodynamic drag

Gasoline cost penalty \$0.16 per gal (gate down)
 \$0.48 per gal (tonneau)

If you anticipate idling longer than 30 to 60 seconds turn off the engine and restart. Rather than use the drive through for fast food, banking, or picking up the dry cleaning, stop and go in. Forego idling at the curb while running a quick errand into a store. Cutting down on the time spent idling can save so much gasoline that Canada has launched a "No Idle Campaign."

Combine errands into one trip. Several short trips taken from a cold start can use twice as much fuel as a longer multipurpose trip covering the same distance, but with a warm engine.

I am trying to reduce my gasoline consumption by combining errands, keeping my car free of junk, driving friendly and watching my expressway speeds.

It is also interesting to note that each gallon of gasoline used not only costs big bucks out of your wallet, but also dumps about 19.4 lbs of carbon dioxide into the air. There are about 127,721,000 passenger cars and 73,775,000 light trucks operating on the roads in this country. It is estimated each car produces about 10,500 lbs. of carbon dioxide annually and each truck about 13,200 lbs. The combined total is over 2.1 trillion pounds or 1.0 billion tons of carbon dioxide annually. That is a lot of hot, polluting gas dumped into the air we all breathe.
